Southeastern Looks Back

When we remember the eighties at Southeastern Hospital Supply Corporation, here is what we may remember the most.

In 1980, Southeastern Hospital Supply had about twenty employees at the Fayetteville location. Now at the same location they have about one hundred and fifty employees. The total number of both locations number two hundred.

In the 1980's Southeastern had three computer systems: Burroughs B700 and B800; an IBM System 34; and an IBM System 36.

In October of 1981 Southeastern Hospital Supply opened a branch office in Richmond, Virginia. This branch office is run by Garland and Betty Rouse.

In 1982 Southeastern bought its first tractor trailer trucks. Today Southeastern has five tractor trailers, seven straight trucks, two step vans, four regular vans, and one station wagon.

In 1985 the nursing home market was extended. Cliff Christianson was promoted to become the director of Long Term Care Sales in 1988. Cliff oversees the development of Southeastern's long term care market (nursing homes). SouthCare was formed as a division of Hospitals, Inc., to perform billing services for nursing homes.

In 1986 Southeastern Hospital Supply started the Southcare Nursing Home Division. It is also called Third Party Billing.

In 1986 The physician's market was extended. Jim Williams came to Southeastern to become Vice-Presi-

dent of Sales and to head the physician/clinic market development.

In 1987 Southeastern opened the Home Health Care Department.

In July of 1988 Southeastern started the 401-K Retirement Plan.

In March of 1989 Southeastern Hospital Supply started the Eq-Flex Employee Benefit plan.

On July 14, 1989, Mr. O.R. Manning, Sr. passed away.

Make It a Safe Holiday Season

Don't let hazards or accidents ruin your festivities. Here are some tips to help you have a safe holiday season.

Do not burn your discarded Christmas tree or gift wrapping paper in a woodstove or fireplace. This could produce a flash fire that burns intensely and sends sparks into a room or up the chimney to ignite creosote deposits.

Never leave lighted candles unattended or place them in window sills. Use artifical boughs made from nonflammable materials when decorating real candles.

Never use more than three stan-

dard-size sets of lights per single extension cord.

Use only fireproof decorations. If small children will be near the tree, place out of their reach those decorations that resemble candy or have sharp points or removable pieces small enough to be swallowed.

Avoid using glasswool or angel hair with spray on snow - a highly combustible combination.

How Did "Xmas" Come To Stand For Christmas

The use of the informal "Xmas" has often been singled out as an example of how the holiday has been commercialized and robbed of its religious content. The X in "Xmas" is actually the descendant of the Greek equivalent of Ch, as in "Christos", which means "Christ'. The letter X has stood for Christ since at least A.D. 1100, and then the term "Xmas" was first cited in 1551. Word expert Eric Partridge points out that the scholarly abbreviation for the

word "Christianity" is "Xianity." So many people dislike

"Xmas" for its supposed crassness that its use is now virtually confined to commercial literature and banners. The New York Times Manual of Style and Usage, for example, offers this simple recommendation for when "Xmas" is acceptable: "Never use."
