Families Get News of War

Nobody ever said it would be easy. Getting married is a big step. Filled with dreams, you and your spouse begin on a road filled with love, happiness, security, and hope. At least that's the way it's supposed to be.

In August of 1990, several of SEHS families were separated when President Bush called military troops into action against Iraq for their occupation of Kuwait. Families hoped Saddam Hussein's troops could leave Kuwait without being forced. Their hopes for a peaceful solution vanished on January 16, 1991.

The night air of Iraq was filled with the thunder of jet engines flying overhead. Flashes of light shot across the sky. The war had begun.

Back at home in Fayetteville, families were sitting down to eat dinner when news on the outbreak of war hit the television. Details were limited, yet very frightening at first. Everyone heard the same story, "We have no further details except to tell you that the war in the Gulf began this evening at 7:00pm Eastern Standard Time."

As the first days of the war passed, televisions all over the country stayed on almost continuously. Families were glued to their sets with hopes of getting a glimpse of their loved ones.

Concerned Employees Take Action

A large number of SEHS employees have relatives and/or friends involved. Realizing this, SEHS went into action to offer its support to the families directly affected by the war. Different ideas were discussed by employees and management before choosing the ones to be used.

Always ready with good ideas, Patti Tolar (customer service) initiated one of the more popular ideas. While sitting in church one Sunday, she thought of having a support group available to the families of SEHS with loved ones overseas. The name of the program is S.O.S. (Southeastern Office Support). This is a group headed by a committee of five employees- Krys Furniss, Pam Greenhill, David Jacobs, Janice Nettles, and Patti Tolar.

Once a month they organize something for the employees with family in Operation: Desert Storm. The meeting might be a potluck supper at someone's house or a night out at the movies or even a cookout for the kids. The main idea is to offer support and a little bit of fun for those interested.

Another idea was initiated by Daphne Manning. Employees with family in the Gulf were asked to submit their overseas addresses. A "Happy Valentine's Day" card was designed by Pam Greenhill and circulated for employees to sign. The card was then printed and mailed to all of the "expanded SEHS family" on active duty in Saudi Arabia.


There were 3 seminars open to any employee that would attend. We learned that every 2 seconds a crime is committed, making anyone a potential victim. We learned that to avoid a crime, we

Ballard Medical Products

In the late 1970's, Dale Ballard started a small research and development company in Midvale, Utah. Today known as **Ballard Medical Products**, it has grown to be one of top 100 fastest growing small public companies in America (*Inc. Magazine*, 1987).

This, Mr. Ballard's second company, went public in August 1983. He was the founder and president of the old Deseret Company from 1956 through 1976. The company was purchased by Warner-Lambert in 1976.

Some of Mr. Ballard's many inventions were the wet prep tray, the impregnated scrub brush, disposable surgeons masks, teflon coated IV catheters and many others while at Deseret.

Since going public in 1983, Ballard Medcial has been a producer of disposable medical products for the healthcare industry. The company's efforts and expenditures in research and development in fiscal 1990 have, once again, resulted in improvements to existing products and in the evolution of new ones. Sales figures of Ballard products in fiscal year 1990 were 42% higher than 1989, and net income was 50% higher.

The majority of Ballard sales are in two broad hospital areas. Critical care areas are intensive care units, emergency rooms, burn units, and respiratory therapy, which along with the operating room, are the areas of modern hospital care.

Foam Care is still the Company's principal product in the operating room, and is a major product line for the Company. Foam Care utilizes a unique foaming device which produces foam without the use of a propellant. The Foam Care formulas delivered as a foam provide the hospital with a more effective reduction in bacterial count at less cost than competing products.

Ballard's surgical scrub brush, Double

Scrub, is an important companion product to Foam Care. A new softer version of the brush was introduced in 1990. The new Double Scrub brush will hopefully enhance market acceptance of the entire Foam Care line. Other newly developed products are an alcohol hand wash and a medicated hand wash both of which should be released in fiscal 1991.

Currently, Ballard Medical has 369 full-time employees, 240 of whom are hourly production employees. The company has 57 salespeople all over the United States. All of Ballard's products are assembled at the company's premises, located in Midvale, Utah.

The company is constructing a new 120,000 square foot plant on 19.5 acres of land in Draper, Utah. The new facility will house its new executive offices and will provide space needed for current and future production.

Internal Medicine Associates

Mike Winfree and Ursula Harrison were pleased to hear their account, Internal Medicine Associates, would be spotlighted in "vital signs". After all, this is one facility that keeps them busy!

Started in 1947 in downtown Greenville, SC, Dr. Robert Stanley probably never expected his practice to grow so quickly. For three years he worked alone until 1950, when Dr. W.R. Craig joined him, and later added Dr. C.W. Harper in 1962. The practice was eventually incorporated in 1979.

Presently, Internal Medicine Associates has ten doctors and 40 employees. Eight of the doctors specialize in internal medicine, with the remaining 2 being cardiologists.

Still located in the town of its origin, Internal Medicine is now located in its brand new 18,400 square foot complex, with 31 exam rooms and 2 stress rooms.

Two special rooms in the building are a pulmonary function room and a holter monitor room.

The doctors, nurses, and other employees see over 140 patients every-day. Another 85 patients a day visit the fully-equipped lab that is operated by 6 very capable technicians.

Two years ago, Internal Medicine joined the Physicians Buying Group offered through SEHS, however that is not where Southeastern's involvement ends. SEHS had a great deal of input into the constuction and setup of the entire complex. Mike Kuna and Joe Czarnecky, representatives of Midmark®, helped SEHS in choosing the 30 Midmark exam tables presently being used.

Areas SEHS helped equip and design are: the entire lab, stress room, holter monitor room, pulmonary function room, and specialty sections of business office and reappointment areas. Two other investments made were a complete Nihon-Kohden® stress package and an EKG machine. In the future, there are plans for a pharmacy and 6 more exam rooms.

Gaston Memorial Hospital

Gaston Memorial Hospital can be identified with one continuing, significant hallmark-progress. Gaston Memorial Hospital is a direct outgrowth of the old City Hospital which opened with nine beds in November of 1908. Just four short years later in 1912, the hospital had outgrown its original quarters and moved to the third floor of the Realty Building, no longer standing, on Main Avenue.



Over the next few years, the hospital weathered the bloodiest war ever fought, World War II. At the close of the war, Gaston Post 23, American Legion, initiated a drive to raise funds through public subscription to purchase the City Hospital and enlarge it to meet crucial hospital needs of the community.

The hospital's name was changed to Gaston Memorial Hospital, and a private not-for-profit corporation was formed under the NC General Statutes which still

exists today. The hospital, as stated in the Certificate of Incorporation, was to be "...an adequate and perpetually useful memorial...to those Gaston County Veterans of World War II, and more particularly to those veterans who paid the supreme sacrifice by giving up their lives while serving in the armed forces during World War II."

The hospital has continued to grow to meet the community needs. Today, Gaston Memorial is a state-of-the-art facility licensed to operate 479 beds. The hospital offers only the best in quality healthcare. Situated

directly off Interstate 85, Gaston Memorial has one of the most beautiful campuses of any hospital in North Carolina. New construction is continually increasing the hospital's ability to serve the people of Gaston County.

Gaston Memorial has several satellite facilities that help keep the cost of healthcare down. One of them is Gaston Ambulatory Services. This outpatient surgical clinic handles those surgical cases that don't require overnight observation of the patient. Another satellite facility is Courtland Terrace, a nursing home, that will serve the elderly in Gaston County. It, and the new Diagnostic Center, have just recently opened.

Gaston Memorial Hospital is a very progressive hospital shown by the fact that they were the first hospital to have a "Stockless Purchasing" study conducted through Southeastern Hospital Supply. Gaston Memorial's Materials Manager, Fred Blevins, can see the advantage and value of the stockless concept and has made every effort to convince his administration to adopt the findings of the study.

Gaston Memorial Hospital is dedicated to "the memory of those Gaston County citizens who have given their lives in the service of their country." -editor

White Oak Manor

Started in the mid 1960's, White Oak Manor has grown into an impressive chain of nursing homes. It was started as a family business, operated by brothers under the name of MGR, Inc.

Over the years, the facilities grew in size. In 1983, the name was changed to White Oak Manor. One of the brothers, **Kent Cecil**, bought the other brothers out in 1986 and the company con-

tinued to grow at a rapid pace.

Presently, White Oak
Manor owns 13 facilities and
manages one from its home
office in Spartanburg, South
Carolina. Seven of the facilities are located in North Carolina with the other seven being

in South Carolina. The chain has made additions over the last several years.

The 13 facilities owned by White Oak Manor have a combination of 1664 nurs-



ing beds with 85 under consturction, 45 personal care beds and up to 267 apartments. The managed facility maintains 100 nursing beds and 60 personal care beds. Over 1400 people are employed throughout the White Oak

Manor system.
